THE CRY TO GOD Psalm 119:145-152

INTRODUCTION

- A. In the parable of the Pharisee and Publican praying (Lk. 18:9-14), the publican's prayer was heard the Pharisee accomplished nothing except to provide an example of how not to pray.
- B. The self-centered man cannot truly pray, because he feels he has no need of God.
- C. The humble man says, "I am weak, but Thou art strong. Hold me with Thy powerful hand. Bread of Heaven, feed me till I lack no more."
- D. In Solomon's prayer for wisdom (1 Kgs. 3:6-9), his focus was on God and His mercy and His people.

I. THE SENSE OF NEED.

- A. At some time or other we have all felt the need of prayer especially in times of crisis.
 - 1. Our most apparent needs financial, social, etc. are selfish and we supply them by our own means.
 - 2. When a crisis comes, we realize we can't handle everything and we cry out to God.
 - a. If this sense of need is only temporary, no satisfactory prayer life will result.
 - b. If it causes an abiding spirit of humility, it becomes a channel of blessings from God.
- B. The Psalmist's Need.
 - 1. Close encounters with Saul?
 - 2. On the run from his son, Absalom?
 - 3. Perhaps the sin with Bathsheba?
 - 4. Maybe it was the exiles longing to be "home".
- C. His Cry for God.
 - 1. Verse 145, "I cried with all my heart; ..."
 - a. An earnest and fervent cry for help.
 - b. Moses told the people, "...you will seek the Lord your God, and you will find Him if you search for Him with all your heart and all your soul" (Deut. 4:29).
 - 2. Verse 147-148, "I rise before dawn...my eyes anticipate the night watches."
 - a. Suggesting a regular time of prayer.
 - b. Examples:
 - i. Daniel 3 times daily.
 - ii. Jesus through the night.
 - iii. Without ceasing, 1 Thess. 5:17.
 - 3. Verse 149, "Hear my voice ... revive me, ..."
 - a. Crying to be heard.
 - b. Crying for God's mercy and goodness.
 - c. Crying for life!

II. OUR HUMAN NEEDS.

- A. In weariness we turn to God for rest, Psalm 37:7.
- B. In weakness we turn to God for health, 2 Corinthians 12:9-10.
- C. In loneliness we turn to God for companionship, Psalm 142:4.

- 1. The apostle Paul, 2 Timothy 4:16-17.
- D. In temptation we turn to God for deliverance, 1 Corinthians 10:13.
- E. In sorrow we turn to God for comfort, Psalm 46:1.
 - 1. Psalm 147:3, "He heals the brokenhearted, and binds up their wounds."
- F. In sin we turn to God for salvation, 1 John 1:9.
- G. In death we turn to God for help, John 14:1-3.

III. OUR NEED FOR GOD.

- A. Hunger and Thirst for God, Mt. 5:6.
 - 1. The chief reason that many of our lives are prayerless lies in the fact that there is no real desire in the soul for God.
 - 2. Man is the storm center of a battle between the spiritual and the physical.
 - 3. The physical can crowd out the spiritual, Matthew 13:22.
- B. When God Made Man.
 - 1. Man was made with choice.
 - 2. When Adam and Eve fell to Satan's temptations, they delivered human flesh to the bondage of death.
 - 3. Ever since then, man has been forced to wrestle against the flesh, Eph. 6:10-13.
 - 4. Every person also has a spiritual nature, no matter how much it may be marred or dwarfed it is capable of making contact with God.
 - a. It begins with the cry, "O wretched man that I am ..." (Rom. 7:24).
 - b. But the secret lies in opening the door of the soul to God.
- C. A Relationship with God.
 - 1. Each verse in this reading speaks of "knowing God".
 - a. Vs. 145 "I will observe Your statutes."
 - b. Vs. 146, "I shall keep Your testimonies."
 - c. Vs. 147, "I wait for Your words."
 - d. Vs. 148, "...so I may meditate on Your word."
 - e. Vs. 149, "...according to Your lovingkindness...Your ordinances."
 - f. Vs. 150, those wicked "are far from Your law."
 - g. Vs. 151, "All Your commandments are truth."
 - h. Vs. 152, "Of old I have known from Your testimonies, that You have founded them forever."
 - 2. God is central in prayer.
 - 3. The more He means to us, the more prayer will mean to us.
 - 4. We desire God for Himself.

- B. It begins with humbling ourselves before Him, and recognizing as Solomon did, "I am but a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in."
